









Board Message

This September looks very different than any we have seen before with teachers, students, and parents facing unprecedented challenges during this new school year. Through this difficult time our DMA Classroom aims to support the learning of everyone in our community whether in person or virtually. Fortunately, we are able to face this time with many tools that allow us to continue to digitally engage with the students and community of Dundas. Beginning this fall we will be offering online education programs for elementary and secondary students. From Kindergarten to Grade 10 select programs will be available virtually from the Dundas Museum and Archives Education Center.

Using our various online resources from Discover Your Historical Dundas to our online collections database, these virtual programs will deliver the same engaging content directly to classrooms. The majority of these programs are popular favourites that have been reimagined for online delivery with the addition of two new virtual programs. The first of our new virCoordinator, or the digital lesson plan can be downloaded to be delivered directly by teachers or parents. The program covers specific curriculum requirements by grade and contains activities, crafts, and discussion questions to encourage deep engagement with the content. Our new Grade 10 program "Dundas and the Spanish Flu" was inspired by our award-winning program "Finding Hazel" and gives high school students the chance to examine primary source documents, learn how Dundas experienced the 1918 Spanish Flu pandemic, and explore what studying history really means. This program deals with sensitive subject matter but encourages students to use the principles of historical inquiry to engage with the past and help inform our future.

As we navigate this challenging time together, we are available to teachers, parents, and students for support. We aim to provide useful resources for our community whether in person or virtually. We wish everyone a safe





My husband is in contact with COVID 19 patients as a physician at Hamilton General Hospital. The kids (age 6, 4 and 2) never get to see him with his full protective gear on, unless he calls us via FaceTime during a break. We taught the kids how to give a foot hug (foot high five) to their daddy when he comes and goes for work. We created a special space for him to sanitize before he comes into the house.

School is cancelled for several months so this means that even the 4 year old has 'Zoom' classes with her pre school teachers and friends at St James Pre school on Melville St. My 6 year old receives daily tasks from her kindergarten teacher and sends photos or videos of them back to her.




I Spy Dundas Feature Exhibition November 5, 2020 to March 6 2021

Here at the Dundas Museum we have a first-hand understanding of how caring for objects from the past helps us to preserve history and memory. An artifact can tell us a lot about the people who made, used, or cared for it. From family photos, fine china, and watercolours, to curiosities, tools, and toys, the artifacts in our Museum all have stories to tell. All these and more will be on display in I Spy Dundas, which highlights local treasures that rarely emerge from our vault. 

Congratulations to Sandra Kiemele 15 Years at the DM&A

On August 15th, our Board of Directors and staff celebrated Archivist Sandra Kiemele's 15th year with the Dundas Museum and Archives. As a valued member of our team, we thank Sandra for her leadership, hard work and dedication throughout her time here at the Museum. This photograph was taken in 2005 during her first week.

A Look at our Archives: Bessie Ridler School

In 1849, Bessie Ridler opened her private school in her home at 34 Hatt Street. The building was later renovated to the Ellen Olser Memorial Home.

The typical school day consisted of arithmetic followed by writing and spelling. History and geography followed spelling with the day ending with home economics. Needlework was one of the main features taught to both girls and boys and was noted to be "an accomplishment not to be despised" by one of her students in later years.



Miss Ridler taught both boys and girls until the age of 12. The school room was in the front room of the house on the ground floor where large windows were present.

A long sloping table with a top that slanted to front and back sat in the room. The children sat on the sides with the boys on one side, the girls on the other with Miss. Ridler siting at the head of the table.

It was common for those who walked by the schoolhouse to hear the sounds of the scrawling of chalk on slate and the voices of children saying "yes Miss Ridler" and "no Miss Ridler."
