and present. I am grateful for your dedicated support of the Museum and the archival program. It is so very much appreciated.









EXHIBITS & EVENTS

WHAT'S NEW AT THE MUSEUM?

The Museum galleries are currently featuring many all-new artifacts and displays which have been added over the past few months.

Main Gallery

Revisit the early history of the Dundas Valley, from its prehistoric peoples to the incorporation of the Town in 1848, with a series of all new interpretive panels and artifact displays in our Main Gallery.

Learn how the little village of Cootes Paradise grew into a bustling hub of industry. See what life was like for Dundasians of the 1840s and 50s. through stunning archival images and a collection of personal artifacts that are almost two hundred years old! Take a tour of the many grocery stores and taverns that lined the streets in the 19th century and were fueled by the worldwide commerce of the Designations Canal. These all-new displays are designed to tell the story of the community's early

development through the remarkable artifacts and archival images that are a part of the Museum's collection.

Other highlights include: a facsimile of a liquor still license owned by Ann Morden, Dundas' the first European settler, a display of tableware and a spittoon from some of Dundas most famous taverns, and the biographies of six of Dundas' most important early industries including the Dundas Cotton Mill.

First Gallery

Find the climbing wall in our First Gallery and you will be able to spot two new panels on the natural history of the Valley. The land of Dundas has been shaped by geological factors that go back almost a half a billion years! The layers of rock in the Niagara escarpment testify to an age when Dundas was at the bottom of a vast tropical sea. Read how climatic factors turned this seabed into a vast ridge

430 million years ago Dundas was at the bottom of a warm tropical sea, and its residents were the curious species of corals, trilobites, and cephalopods seen here. Remains of these creatures are preserved as fossils in the layers of the escarpment.

curving across southern Ontario, which was then carved out, millions of years later, by the mighty alaciers of the ice age! Even today, the natural environment around Dundas is one of its defining features. The ecologically rich areas of the Bruce Trail and Cootes Paradise have made the region a UNESCO World Biosphere Reserve. See what wildlife shares the valley with us and learn

how to identify common local species. But be sure to read the rules of the trail!

Community Curator

The Museum is excited to announce the return of our Community Curator exhibit space. Our current display commemorates Dundas Hockeyville 2010. It was just over a decade ago that the Valley Town won the Kraft Hockeyville Contest with over a million votes!

What followed was a week of celebrations and Hockey games that touched every part of the community and saved the Grightmire Arena. Relive the festivities with a collection of memorabilia and photographs donated to the Museum by our guest community curator **Paul Robb**.

Dundas Lime Kilns | Circa 1890

This watercolour by Marie Holmestead sketch shows the old lime kilns as they once appeared on the side of the escarpment just east of the Dundas Peak. Originally built in the 1840s to produce lime as a flux for local iron foundries, the ruins of these stone structures can still be seen.

ARTIST KAREN LOGAN

The DM+A presents 'Backyard Neighbors', the most recent exhibit by Hamilton artist Karen Logan. Her drypoint illustrations of local indigenous species highlight the rich biodiversity of the Hamilton/Dundas area.

Each of the 35 works on display depict a local animal or plant that Karen has observed in her own backyard. The show will run until July 10th.

Your DM+A bench will have an engraved aluminum memorial plague mounted to commemorate your loved one or family at the DM+A.



Cecil R. Barlow | Artist Biography



Cecil Barlow was born in 1919, and turned 102 on May 30, 2021. Barlow's great passion for art began from a very

young age and although he no longer paints, he still loves to "doodle". His first art teacher was Hortense Gordon from Hamilton, a member of the Painters Eleven. During WWII, Cecil created War Bonds and posters. The stylistic impact of his employment can be seen in his paintings. His other influences were Canadian Alex Colville and American painter, Andrew Wveth.

Cecil worked as a commercial artist for Clark Productions. a silk screen advertising company once located in Dundas,

Ontario. His paintings won numerous 1st place finishes in the annual CKOC Art Shows in the 70s and 1980s. Barlow became a founding member of the Escarpment Group of Painters. This group consisted of 13 artists from Hamilton, Burlington and St. Catherines. They held art shows annually and displayed their works in local galleries. Cecil's work also went national and was featured in galleries from coast to coast.

His Work

He enjoyed Plein Air painting, capturing the landscapes in natural light. At a time when

Surrealism and Abstract Expressionism was popular, he bucked the trend as a Realist. Barlow painted with vivid colours of green, gold, cerise, orange, azure, and cerulean; a "Hippie Colour palette" that reflected the 1970s time-frame of much of his work. As time and his technique progressed we see him paint with a more muted palette. His choice of medium was mostly mixed media, watercolour, gouache, egg tempera.
