# **New Feature Exhibition: DEEP FOCUS**

Welcome to Deep Focus: Dundas Glass Negative Photography. The newest exhibition at the Dundas Museum and Archives aims to show that some of the most remarkable photographs ever taken of Dundas were taken directly on glass.

Before the invention of photographic film, plates of cut glass coated with a light-sensitive emulsion were used as a medium for early photography. Though delicate, these photographic plates are striking for their sharpness and clarity, preserving moments from the past in unparalleled detail. The DMA is home to a collection of several hundred original glass negatives taken by local photographers. Dating from the 1850s to the 1930s, these images recorded the period in which the early Victorian Town of Dundas developed into the community we know today.

What is a glass negative? A "glass negative" is simply a photographic plate that has been exposed within a camera and had a picture taken on it. The light-sensitive emulsion coating the plate turns dark when exposed to light. For this reason, the lightest part of the scene makes the darkest spot on the plate, creating an image that is 'negative.'

The glass negative collection has always been a source of particular interest for the staff here at the Dundas Museum and Archives. The images preserved in this part of our archive represent some of the most visually striking and iconic views of historical Dundas ever taken. Because of their remarkable quality, they have been used countless times in exhibitions, publications, and advertisements over the years.

But their incredible detail also makes them invaluable sources of historical information, and we often consult them when conducting research. This exhibit aims to allow the visitor to explore these images as we do, discovering the fascinating details hidden within them. We hope visitors will leave having experienced what makes these photos so magical.

# **Anniversary Ambrotypes**

Ambrotypes, sometimes called collodion positives, were created by underexposing glass negatives and placing the resulting image against a dark background.

The DMA collections include these examples (right), which are coated in a black lacquer on the reverse. Like the earlier daguerreotypes, ambrotypes were often placed in decorative gilded cases. The donor of these ambrotypes found them in Niagara-on-the-Lake and decided to remove the photographs from their cases to take a peek at what was

inside. Remarkably, in two of the cases were notes identifying both the photographer (R.S. Brooke) and the sitter – John Kerwin! The photographs were taken for Kerwin's 20th and 25th birthdays, in 1861 and 1866.

John Kerwin was born in Dundas on May 30, 1841, the son of Patrick Kerwin and Mary Bird. When he sat for these portraits, Kerwin was working as a plasterer. From 1880 until his retirement in 1910, Kerwin was a grocer on the north-east corner of King and Church Streets.

According to T. Roy Woodhouse, the grocery "was protected by an electric burglar alarm with a bell in the house. He also laid bear traps covered with wrapping paper on the floor behind the counter... He once caught a burglar who sawed the trap off his leg using a knife for a saw. The burglar escaped, but Chief Twiss followed a trail of blood and arrested him." Kerwin died on January 27th, 1918.

Sadly, we have yet to identify the man in the third image.





# "New Model" Glass Negative Camera


The dry plate camera that you can peer through in our new Feature Exhibit is known as the "New Model," made by the Rochester Optical Company between 1885 and 1903.

This size was originally priced at \$12.00, but did not include a tripod or lens, which would have been purchased separately. The New Model was marketed as a good quality, but affordable, amateur camera.

The original owner of this camera, Herbert Whipple Temple, lived from 1874 until 1944. He worked in the Canadian Customs Office from 1908 until 1939. His daughter, Dorothy Betzner, donated his New Model camera to the Museum in 1968.


